End of season entry:

We hope you enjoyed your stay!



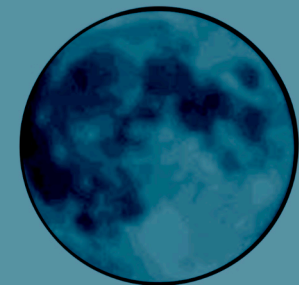

Radio Calls

Incident Record Keeping and Journaling

Every week you'll receive multiple radio calls from Ranger HQ requiring your attention. These might be as benign as ensuring the fencing at Widower's Walk is repaired, or as exciting as an agitated Black Bear spotted by hikers.

You'll receive [d2]+1 radio calls per week, and are stationed for 8 weeks. To receive a radio call, roll a [d20] and compare the result to the map legend. This is the location you'll need to respond to. Then roll [d66] and draw a card to receive the keywords and weather prompt. Once you've tracked all the information, discard the card you've drawn.

Keywords may not initially connect together or make much sense, and that is fine. Take the time you need to connect them as you travel to the location of the call, and even work the confusion into the investigation if you need to!

Once you reach the location you'll need to investigate the area, ensure everything is in safe and working condition, and then document the incident.

Document the incident by detailing what has happened here, and how you resolved the situation. You may also add your own personal feelings and responses to these incidents if applicable. This is encouraged, as the health and wellbeing of Rangers at Evergreen Wilds is very important. All journal entries are archived with Ranger HQ, and all personal information is kept private.

To investigate and document the incident, use the keywords and weather prompt from the radio call to create an entry in your journal. Be as creative or as dull as you choose, keeping in mind that you may not always come across wild and exciting events; sometimes it's just a mistake or a broken trail marker.

Once you've finished, mark the incident as Resolved. You should now return to the Ranger Station and await the next call. Be sure to categorize your incidents by day and week so that the official record can be stored chronologically.

End of the Week Log:

At the end of each week, take some time to reflect on the incidents that you investigated as well as any moments, places you visited, or people you met that had an impact on you. Detail how these things affected you, how they changed you, or helped you stabilize.
